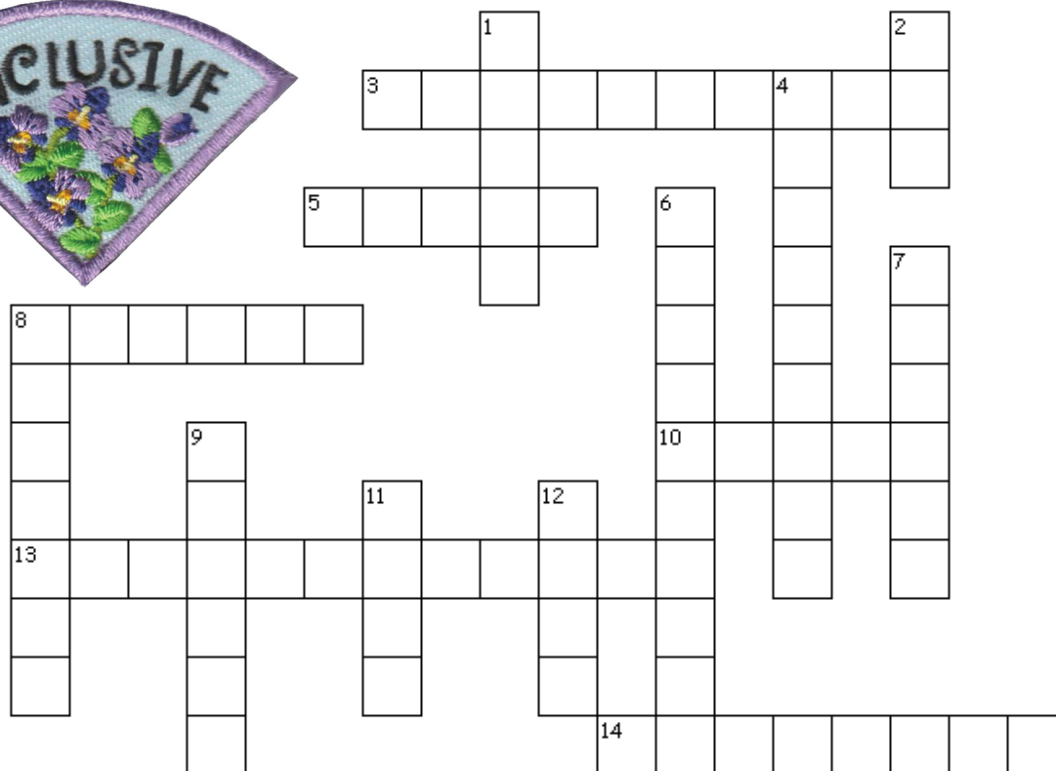


Inclusion Matters
